## More of an Attitude than a Custom Tool, version 1.1

I hesitated to write this short article because it is almost too simple to mention. But maybe it will spark more advanced ideas in the readers.



Yup, this is a common sprayer from Ace Hardware. I use it to spray Roundup. The instructions on the bottle of Roundup says to mix 3 ounces of the defoliant with 1 gallon of water. That ratio is buried deep in the pamphlet stuck to the side of the bottle. I use this stuff about twice a year and don't trust my memory. It then occurred to me that if I labeled the water level in the sprayer with the amount of Roundup needed, I wouldn't need to trust my memory anymore. The 1 gallon level is marked "3 oz" and the 2 gallon level is marked "6 oz".

Old guy problem solved.
